

Term stillbirths - how often in the UK?



One in 200 births ends in stillbirth



One in three stillbirths occurs at term (37+ weeks' gestation) when a baby has the greatest chance of surviving.

Missed opportunities



Developing diabetes in pregnancy

Around half of the women reviewed had at least one risk factor for developing diabetes in pregnancy – mainly women who were obese or from a high risk ethnic group - but two out of three of these women were not offered testing.



Monitoring growth

In nearly **two thirds of cases** reviewed national guidance for screening and monitoring the growth of the baby was not followed.



Identifying reduced fetal movements

Almost half the women had contacted their maternity units concerned that their baby's movements had slowed, changed or stopped. In half of these there were missed opportunities to potentially save the baby.



Local review of care

For three quarters of stillbirths there was no evidence in the notes that a local review of the care had been carried out. Where a review had been done very few followed standards set out in national guidance or involved parents' views of their care.









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
